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FOR RELEASE: April 8, 2008 Gee, Moran Named PAC SAAC Scholar-Athletes of the Month for March, 2008

WEXFORD, Pa. - The Presidents' Athletic Conference has named **Kelli Gee (Washington, Pa./Washington H.S.)** of Washington & Jefferson College and **Brian Moran (Columbia, Md./Chapelgate Christian H.S.)** of Grove City College as its PAC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) Scholar-Athletes of the Month, for March 2008.

Gee, a senior jumper/sprinter for the President women's track & field team, ran a leg on the 4x100 relay which took third at the Western Pennsylvania Championships on March 29 in an ECAC qualifying time of 50.40. She also won the triple jump (10.9m), helped the 4x100 relay team lower its time to 49.37, and took second in the long jump (5.3m) at the Washington & Jefferson Invitational. Gee was recently named PAC Field Athlete of the Week. In the classroom, she maintains a 3.96 grade-point average (GPA) as a biology major and serves as the vice president of the Washington & Jefferson SAAC.

Moran, a senior on the Wolverine baseball team, is batting .381 with one home run and 13 RBIs and has scored 11 runs this season. He was named to the All-PAC First team in 2007. In the classroom, Moran carries a 3.1 GPA as a marketing management major. He is a member of Phi Omega Sigma and participates in Team Bible Study.

Other nominees include Bethany softball player **Heather Immesberger**, Grove City track & field athlete **Brittany Anderson**, and Westminster track & field athlete **Megan Harding**.

Each month, SAAC members from each PAC institution are eligible to nominate two junior or senior varsity student athletes (one male, one female) from their school. All PAC Scholar-Athlete nominations must be in season, have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher, and be actively involved in their campus community.

Founded in 1955, the Presidents' Athletic Conference continues its mission of promoting intercollegiate athletics and the pursuit of academic excellence. Consisting of 10 select private institutions in Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Kentucky, the PAC remains a unique organization in this day of high pressure intercollegiate athletics. With academics at the center of each member's philosophy, the PAC is built on the principle that an athletic program is a part of college life, but not an entity in itself.

The PAC annually crowns champions in 19 sports (10 men, nine women). In 2006-07, the conference had 24 teams represent the conference in postseason play, including 14 in NCAA championship events.
